The diagram below summarizes the major ways in which education can contribute to the development of democratic citizenship.

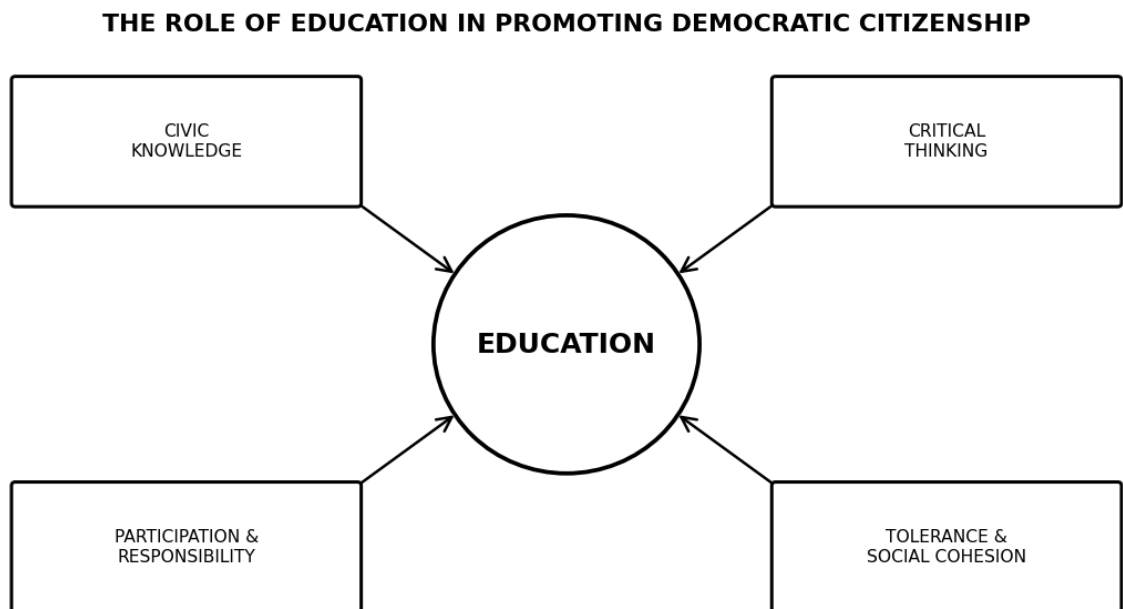


Figure 1. Simplified overview of education and democratic citizenship.
