The diagram below summarizes the principal ways in which media can contribute to stronger democratic governance.

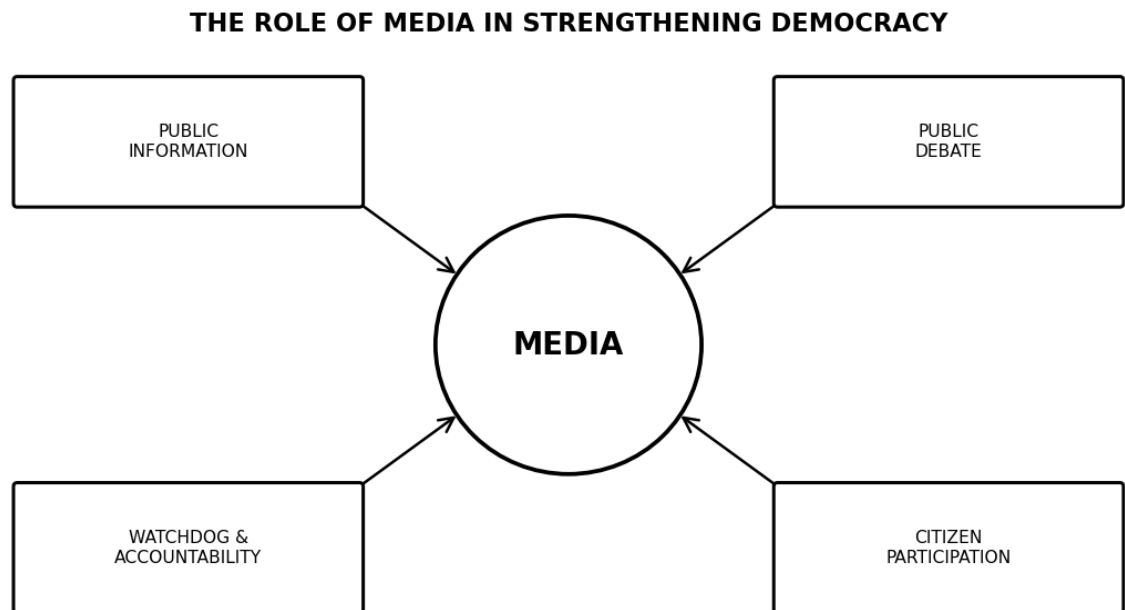


Figure 1. Simplified overview of the role of media in strengthening democracy.
