The diagram below summarizes the major municipal governance mechanisms that can contribute to improved urban governance.

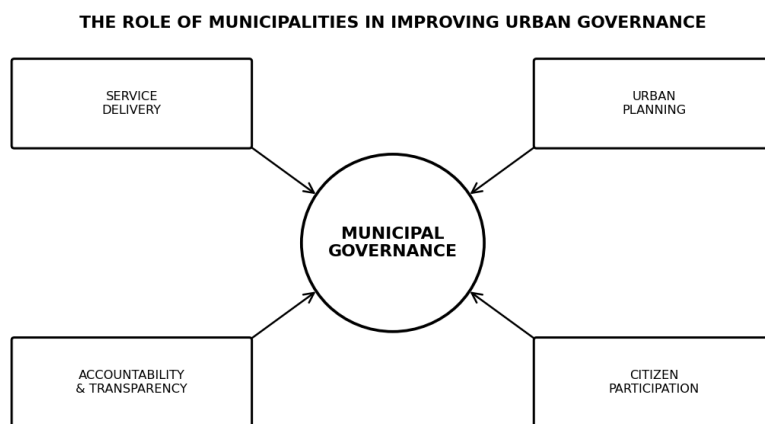


Figure 1. Simplified overview of municipalities and improved urban governance.
