The diagram below summarizes the major judicial mechanisms through which constitutional rights are protected.

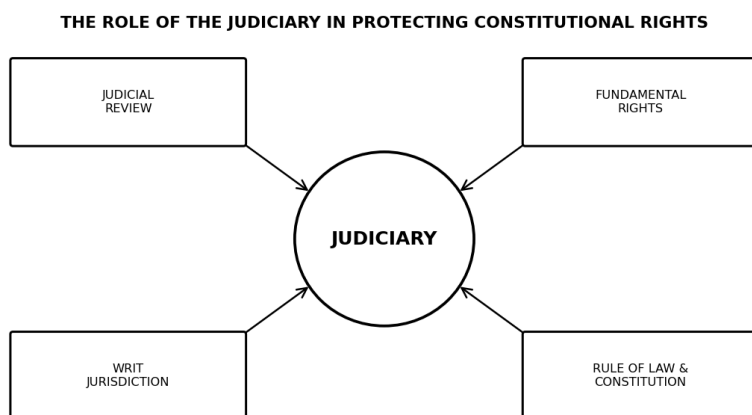


Figure 1. Simplified overview of the judiciary and protection of constitutional rights.
