The diagram below summarizes the major functions through which Parliament contributes to Indian democracy.

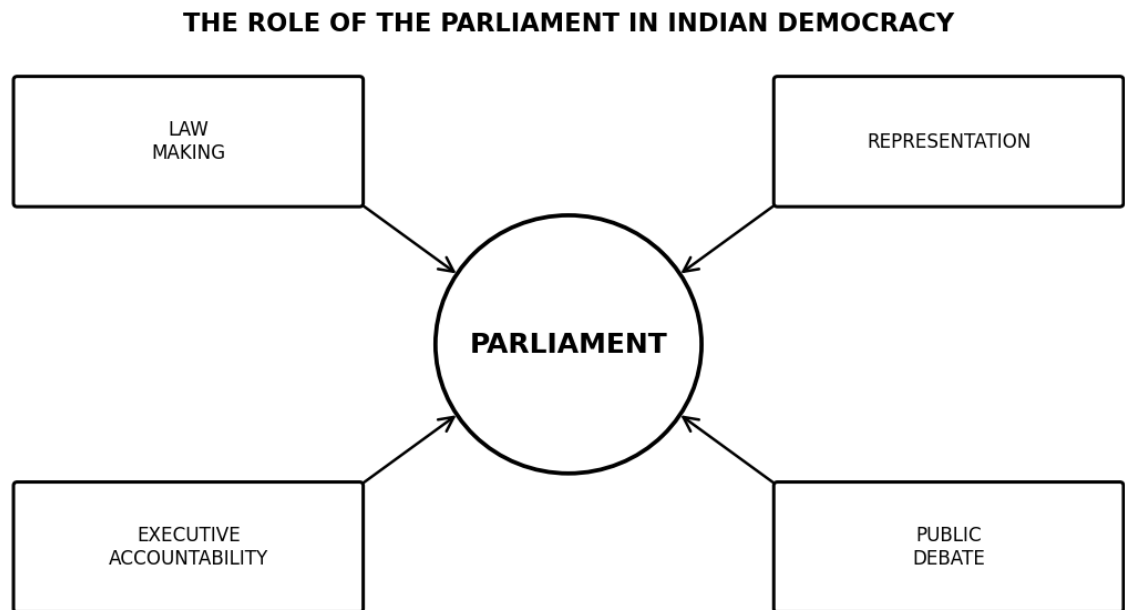


Figure 1. Simplified overview of the role of Parliament in Indian democracy.
