

The Role of the Prime Minister in Indian Governance

The diagram below summarizes the major dimensions through which the Prime Minister contributes to Indian governance.

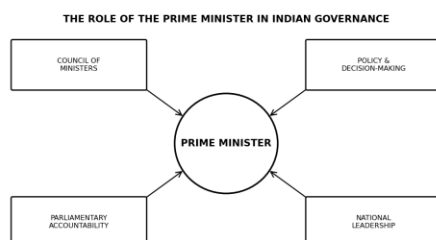


Figure 1. Simplified overview of the role of the Prime Minister in Indian governance.
