The diagram below summarizes the major ways in which young citizens can contribute to democratic politics.

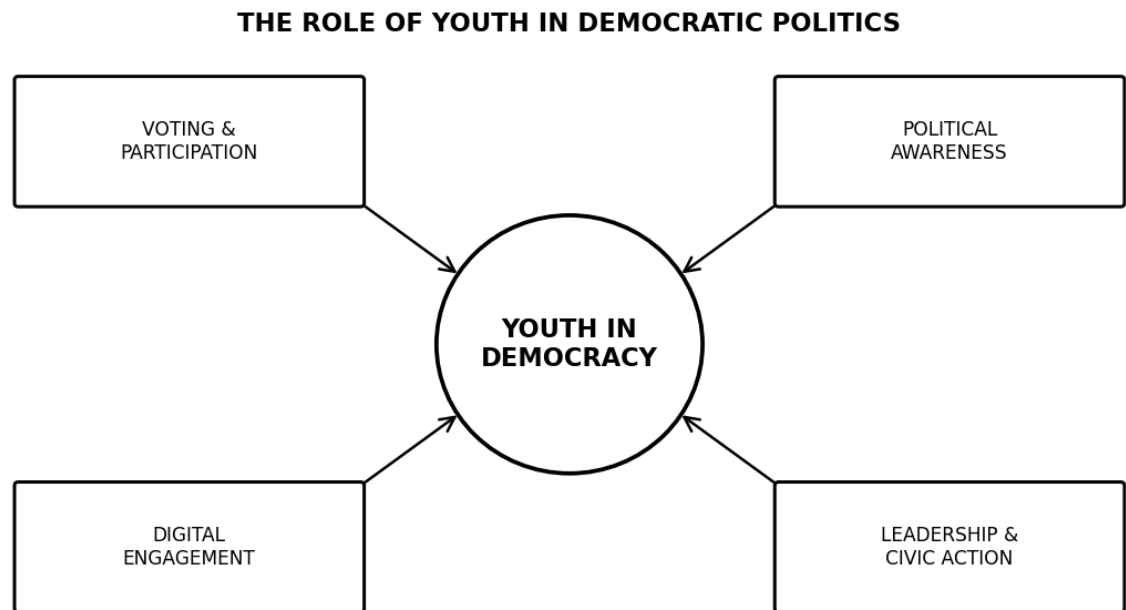


Figure 1. Simplified overview of youth participation in democratic politics.
